## School Policies <br> (In Student Handbook - given to all students on first day of school)

- Dress Policy - must reflect a standard of modesty and courtesy that is appropriate and fitting for an educational environment. No headwear
- Smoking and Tobacco Policy - students are not allowed to chew tobacco or smoke anywhere on school campus or during off-campus classes
- Technology Policy - District Policy
- Alcohol and Drug Policy - use of drugs and alcohol are strictly prohibited
- Quad School Policy - Unacceptable behavior during any of the 4 school functions
- Attendance Policy - Student's are excused from their classes for school related activities, illness, and unavoidable circumstances
- Academic Improvement Policy - rewrites on specific assessments within each discipline
- Cell Phone Policy - no communication devices are allowed in the classroom or during instructional time
- Academic Honesty Policy - plagiarism


## Important Information About Credits and Courses

- You need to obtain 100 credits throughout Gr. 10-12 in order to graduate.
- Some classes you will get everyday at the same time in the day (These are worth 5 credits)
- Some classes you will get every second day at the same time in the day (These are worth 3 credits)
- We have two semesters throughout the year. You will have the same classes for one entire semester.
Semester One - Beginning of the year - End of January Semester Two - Beginning of February - End of June
- Credit Load Requirement

Grade 10 - No spares - must have a full timetable Grade 11 - Can have one spare every $2^{\text {nd }}$ day if you have put in 125 hours of Work Experience
Grade 12 - Must be enrolled in a minimum of 30 credits

- Work Experience - If you have a job or plan on getting a job, you can receive credits as long as you register with a W.E. Coordinator (Mrs. Rebbeck or Mr. Immel).
Fifteen credits of W.E. can go towards your Diploma Requirements.


## Important Information (Con't)

- Work Experience Bonus (WEB) - You can earn an additional 15 credits in W.E. If you do this, you will receive up to $\$ 500.00$ when you graduate.
15 credits for diploma + 5 credits $=\$ 100.00$
15 credits for diploma +10 credits $=\$ 300.00$
15 credits for diploma +15 credits $=\$ 500.00$
- Credit Completion Scholarship - You can earn as much as $\$ 500.00$ by achieving extra credits
$120-125$ credits $=\$ 100.00$
$125-130$ credits $=\$ 200.00$
$130-135$ credits $=\$ 300.00$
$135-140$ credits $=\$ 400.00$
140 credits or more $=\$ 500.00$
- Names and Numbers of Courses

If it has a 10 behind the name - Grade 10 level course If it has a 20 behind the name - Grade 11 level course If it has a 30 behind the name - Grade 12 level course Note: If you have successfully completed a 10 level course, you can register into a 20 level course while you are still in Gr. 10 (not recommended for some courses)

## Choosing the Right Academic Plan For Your Child

- Varying Levels of Difficulty in Core Classes

If there is a "dash 1 " beside the course name, this is the most difficult academic class and is set up for the top 35\% of the students. (Example: English 10-1, English 20-1, English 30-1, Social 10-1, Social 20-1, Social 30-1)
Note: Recommended Prerequisite Mark for English and Social is $65 \%$ to enroll in a Dash One class.

If there is a "dash 2" beside the course name, this is the next level of academic class.(For Example:
English 10-2, English 20-2, English 30-2, Social 10-2, Social 20-2, Social 30-2.)

Math and Science are a little different. The top academic class in Math and Science are called Math 10 Common and Science 10. (The recommended prerequisite mark for these classes are 60\%)
The next level is called Math 10-3 and Science 14.
